## Read this model first:

## How to write an argumentative essay?

An argumentative essay is a text that presents the writer's opinion on a specific topic and uses evidence to support that position. The goal of an argumentative essay is to convince your reader that your position is right. In this model, the writer chose not to take sides. In argumentative essays, you must present:

- A persuasive thesis statement in the introduction paragraph
- One or two paragraphs that use evidence and explanations to support the thesis statement
- A paragraph addressing opposing positions on the topic—when appropriate

- A conclusion that summarizes the writer's point of view and gives the audience something to think about. - plan your essay first: make a list of pros and cons

- Write a first draft. Develop your arguments and use linking words. Here is a list of some useful phrases: *There are advantages and disadvantages to …*

In addition / Moreover / Furthermore A further advantage (of) / problem (with) ... is ... *In Conclusion, To sum up / On the whole-* Before you copy your draft over, revise it. Avoid repetitions, edit weak vocabulary (avoid expletives like "there is/are", "it is", and weak adjectives used with 'very')
